6 (a) FINDINGS.—Co	ongress makes the following find-	
7 ings:		

1	(1) United States military forces face an ever
2	increasing and constantly evolving threat from small
3	unmanned aerial systems in operations worldwide,
4	whether in the United States or abroad.
5	(2) The Department of Defense is already
6	doing important work to address the threats from
7	small unmanned aerial systems worldwide, though
8	the need for engagement in that area continues.
9	(b) EXECUTIVE AGENT.—
10	(1) In general.—The Secretary of the Army
11	is the executive agent of the Department of Defense
12	for programs, projects, and activities to counter
13	small unmanned aerial systems (in this section re-
14	ferred to as the "Counter-Small Unmanned Aerial
15	Systems Program").
16	(2) Functions.—The functions of the Sec-
17	retary as executive agent shall be as follows:
18	(A) To develop the strategy required by
19	subsection (c).
20	(B) To carry out such other activities to
21	counter threats to United States forces world-
22	wide from small unmanned aerial systems as
23	the Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of
24	the Army consider appropriate.

1	(3) STRUCTURE.—The Secretary as executive
2	agent shall carry out the functions specified in para
3	graph (2) through such administrative structures as
4	the Secretary considers appropriate.
5	(c) Strategy To Counter Threats From Small
6	Unmanned Aerial Systems.—Not later than 90 days
7	after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary
8	of the Army, as executive agent for the Counter-Small Un
9	manned Aerial Systems Program, shall develop and sub
10	mit to relevant committees of Congress a strategy for the
11	Armed Forces to effectively counter threats from small un
12	manned aerial systems worldwide. The report shall be sub
13	mitted in classified form.
14	(d) REPORT ON EXECUTIVE AGENT ACTIVITIES.—
15	(1) Report required.—Not later than one
16	year after the date of the enactment of this Act, the
17	Secretary of the Army, as executive agent for the
18	Counter-Small Unmanned Aerial Systems Program
19	shall submit to Congress a report on the Counter
20	Small Unmanned Aerial Systems Program.
21	(2) Elements.—The report required by para
22	graph (1) shall include the following:
23	(A) A description and assessment of the
24	structure and activities of the executive agen-

1	as established and put in place by the Sec-
2	retary, including the following:
3	(i) Any obstacles hindering the effec-
4	tive discharge of its functions and activi-
5	ties, including limitations in authorities or
6	policy.
7	(ii) The changes, if any, to airspace
8	management, rules of engagement, and
9	training plans that are required in order to
10	optimize the use by the Armed Forces of
11	counter-small unmanned aerial systems.
12	(B) An assessment of the implementation
13	of the strategy required by subsection (c), and
14	a description of any updates to the strategy
15	that are required in light of evolving threats to
16	the Armed Forces from small unmanned aerial
17	systems.
18	(e) REPORT ON THREAT FROM SMALL UNMANNED
19	AERIAL SYSTEMS.—
20	(1) Report required.—Not later than 180
21	days after the submittal of the strategy required by
22	subsection (c), the Secretary of Defense shall submit
23	to the appropriate committees of Congress a report
24	that sets forth a direct comparison between the
25	threats United States forces in combat settings face

1	from small unmanned aerial systems and the capa-
2	bilities of the United States to counter such threats.
3	The report shall be submitted in classified form.
4	(2) COORDINATION.—The Secretary shall pre-
5	pare the report required by paragraph (1) in coordi-
6	nation with the Director of National Intelligence,
7	and with such other appropriate officials of the intel-
8	ligence community, and such other officials in the
9	United States Government, as the Secretary con-
10	siders appropriate.
11	(3) Elements.—The report required by para-
12	graph (1) shall include the following:
13	(A) An evaluation and assessment of the
14	current and evolving threat being faced by
15	United States forces from small unmanned aer-
16	ial systems.
17	(B) A description of the counter-small un-
18	manned aerial system systems acquired by the
19	Department of Defense as of the date of the en-
20	actment of this Act, and an assessment whether
21	such systems are adequate to meet the current
22	and evolving threat described in subparagraph
23	(A).

1	(4) Appropriate committees of congress
2	DEFINED.—In this subsection, the term "appro-
3	priate committees of Congress" means—
4	(A) the Committee on Armed Services and
5	the Select Committee on Intelligence of the
6	Senate; and
7	(B) the Committee on Armed Services and
8	the Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence
9	of the House of Representatives.
10	(f) Comptroller General of the United
11	STATES ASSESSMENT OF COUNTER-SMALL UNMANNED
12	Aerial Systems Program.—
13	(1) Assessment.—Not later than 180 days
14	after the submittal of the strategy required by sub-
15	section (e), the Comptroller General of the United
16	States shall submit to the congressional defense
17	committees a report setting forth the results of an
18	assessment, conducted by the Comptroller General
19	for purposes of the report, of the efficacy of the
20	Counter-Small Unmanned Aerial Systems Program.
21	(2) Elements.—The assessment conducted
22	pursuant to paragraph (1) shall include the fol-
23	lowing:
24	(A) An identification of metrics to assess
25	progress in the implementation of the strategy

1	required by subsection (c), which metrics shall
2	take into account the threat assessment re-
3	quired for purposes of subsection (e).
4	(B) An assessment of progress, and key
5	challenges, in the implementation of the strat-
6	egy using such metrics, and recommendations
7	for improvements in the implementation of the
8	strategy.
9	(C) An assessment of the extent to which
10	the Department of Defense is coordinating ade-
11	quately with other departments and agencies of
12	the United States Government, and other ap-
13	propriate entities, in the development and pro-
14	curement of counter-small unmanned aerial sys-
15	tems for the Department.
16	(D) An assessment of the extent to which
17	the designation of the Secretary of the Army as
18	executive agent for the Counter-Small Un-
19	manned Aerial Systems Program has reduced
20	redundancies and increased efficiencies in pro-
21	curement of counter-small unmanned aerial sys-
22	tems.
23	(E) An assessment whether United States
24	technological progress on counter-small un-
25	manned aerial systems is sufficient to maintain

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1 a competitive edge over the small unmanned 2 aerial systems technology available to United 3 States adversaries.

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
